The project is aimed at senior citizens aged 60+ and young people in the age range: 18-35 from the area Warsaw and Raszyn (village near Warsaw).

The Norwegian NGO Kinsarvik Bygdekvinnelag is a partner in the project.

The goals of the project

- to increase active participation of members of the local community by intergenerational integration,
- to build positive relations and cooperation between elderly and young residents of the community,
- to develop of the creative potential of young and old,
- to encourage of lifelong learning.

The goals of the project will be realized through intergenerational creative workshops:

- filmmaking,
- screen printing,
- theater meetings "Theater at First Sight",
- making traditional Christmas decorations,
- dance party with exhibition of works,
- a social campaign to countering ageism and age-related stereotypes.

Our partnership

The aim of the partnership is:

- to exchange good practice,
- to learn from norwegian experiences in the area of intergenerational activities, and concepts of social campaigns against ageism between local NGOs Polish and Norwegian NGOs.

A study visit in Norway

2 meetings.
